Car Park Safety

Thank you to the overwhelming majority of parents who drive responsibly when picking up and dropping off children at school. However, we have had several parents as well as members of the public contacting us regarding a small number of driver's who's actions are causing concern for the safety of the children and other road users. We would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone to make the right choices for the safety of all concerned.

In the Streets around the school

- Please park responsibly and not where there are double yellow lines
- Make sure children exit the car onto the pavement at the side of the road and not into the middle of the road
- Please use the pavements, walkways/cycleways and lollipop crossings

School Car Parks

- The car park behind the Infant Hall is for Kitchen Staff parking and Delivery vehicles
 only and should not be used by parents to pick up and drop off children.
- At peak times car parks can be very congested but please park in designated car park spaces only. Don't use the Disabled or Taxi parking spaces unless you are entitled to do so
- Do not reverse in the car parks unless you are absolutely sure it is safe to do so
- If you have to stop in the car park but are not in a parking space please do not leave your vehicle unattended as it may need to move at very short notice.



To avoid the congestion we would always encourage children to walk to school as the healthy, environmentally friendly option. If you have to deliver your children to school by car an alternative would be to park farther away from the school where it is less congested and let the children walk the last part of the journey.

FACTinders - still going strong!

FACTfinders started in 2008 as a joint initiative between Papdale Primary School and Christian Growth Centre Orkney to provide an opportunity for Dads and children to have some fun together. Meetings are held monthly during term time, usually on the first Sunday of each month at the Life Centre on East Road where there is a crèche/ play area, games room with air hockey, pool, table tennis and table football and a lounge with Wii games and snacks.

Fencing


