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# **School setting and Travel Information**

Papdale is a non-denominational primary school for children from Nursery (3 years old) up to Primary 7. The current school roll is 544 (including Early Learning and Childcare).

Papdale Primary School caters for pupils in Kirkwall, with a catchment area serving the eastern and central part of the town and surrounding parish of St.Ola.


### Walking

The school strongly encourages children to walk to school using the School Crossing Patrol Officer (SCPO) Crossing points wherever possible. The recommended routes to access the rear playground when arriving at school are through link doors beside the school main entrance or in front of the Primary wing. The cycle/walkway running from KGS to Willowburn Road can also be used but care should be taken (at the Infant Hall end) to stay on the walkway as service vehicles may also need to access the school kitchen. Only service vehicles and kitchen/school staff are permitted to use this for vehicle access.

## **Cycling**

Whilst responsibility always rests with the parents to decide whether it is safe for their child to cycle to school it is recommend, following safety advice, that children should only be considered ready to cycle to school if they have either completed the Bikeability Level 2 cycle training successfully or are currently being trained and you are satisfied that they understand and can safely execute the correct procedures highlighted in the guidance booklets issued to all children involved in cycle training. Children should not cycle on the school grounds during the school day, this includes the school car park areas. Bikeability Level 2 Cycle training is provided after school in term one for all primary 6 children given parental consent to participate.





### **School Bus**

Entitlement to school transport is decided by the local authority and depends on how far pupils live from the school and their age.

Free transport to and from school is provided to all pupils who live more than two miles (under 8years old) or three miles (8 years old and over) from their catchment school This is reduced to over 1.5 miles for all pupils during the winter terms (October break to Easter break). Currently 18 pupils (3.3%) are entitled to free school transport

To ensure that all children are accounted for on the homeward journey the school ask parents/guardians of children who are entitled to school transport and who normally travel on the school bus to inform the school any day that their child will not be travelling on the bus. This can be done via a phone call to the school office or note to the class teacher.



## Parking and dropping children off at school

The playground is supervised from 8.45am so children should not arrive at school before this time. The school day starts at 9.00am.

Inappropriate parking around the school can compromise the safety of children. This includes stopping on double yellow lines, parking on pavements, using the service vehicle only access at the end of the Infant Hall as a drop off point, blocking access to car parks by parking where there is no designated space or using one of the bus/taxi/ disabled parking spaces without entitlement.

The school advise extreme care and consideration is taken when manoeuvring (particularly reversing) in the car parks and around the school as children may be close by. Parking spaces may be at a premium but motorists are asked to park responsibly to keep all our children as safe as possible.

To try and alleviate some of this congestion Kirkwall Grammar School have kindly agreed to allowing parents to use their car park as an alternative pick up and drop off point for children going to Papdale School. This is the safest and most easily accessed car parking option for pick up and drop off and is only a short walk from Papdale by the cycle/walkway. Use of this area for **Park and Stride** will count towards pupil WOW badges – see Appendix 2

# **Policy and Objectives**

## **Orkney's Green Travel Plan**

Orkney already boasts higher walking and cycling levels to work than national Scotland. However, Orkney also has one of the highest car ownership levels in Scotland, given the islands largely dispersed population.

High car ownership, a dispersed population and limited public transport in some areas make it challenging to encourage a shift to sustainable travel as these are often seen as less convenient or realistic options.

Further work is required to increase walking and cycling levels, particularly purposeful journeys to work, <u>school</u> or the shops to achieve the Cycling Action Plan Scotland's ambitious target of 10% cycling mode share.

Papdale Primary School are committed to working in partnership with parents and the wider community. We have an active and effective Parent Council who ensure parent's views, opinions and ideas are shared with the school. We try to promote a sense of community spirit and belonging. Together we work hard to ensure our children can be all they can be!

Papdale primary have provided information to the annual Scotland Hands Up Survey since 2009.

During the period since the survey started walking levels have shown a steep decline, while cycling levels have varied but overall remain higher than the national average. Levels of pupils driven to school have increased significantly during the period 2009-20.

Papdale Primary have taken part in the Living Streets WOW programme to encourage active and sustainable travel to school for several years. Since 2018 they have been using the WOW Travel Tracker to record daily journeys and have shown a significant improvement in Park and Stride levels during this time. 

# Welcome to WOW – The year-round walk to school challenge from Living Streets Scotland.

The purpose of **WOW** is to encourage pupils, parents and carers to walk to school at least once a week. Children record when they walk to school using the **WOW Travel Tracker**. Each month, children who have walked, or travelled actively, at least once every week throughout the month receive a collectable badge. The threshold for collecting a badge can be raised as the scheme progresses to keep WOW challenging. Different badge designs are awarded each month based around a theme – This year it is 'Inventions that Changed the World'

WOW aims to get more children walking (cycling and scootering) to school and the online WOW Travel Tracker helps you to keep an accurate tally of this and reward children who use **Active** modes of travel. The mode choices available on the Travel Tracker are:

Active: Walk, Cycle, Scooter or skate, Park and Stride (get a lift some of the way and walk the rest)

Non-active: Driven, Bus (use park and stride option if children are walking to meet the bus or walking as part of another activity), Taxi (same as for bus if you would like these to count towards a badge) and other.



# Appendix 4 – Education initiatives

In line with Curriculum for Excellence, pupils are taught about road safety at all stages. A range of opportunities to engage children at every level in road safety learning are available:



Road safety learning and the seven principles of Curriculum for Excellence





**Progression** — young people, as road users, experience continuous progression in their learning with each stage building upon earlier knowledge and achievements.

**Depth** — young people, as road users, are given opportunities to draw on previous experiences and apply these to new situations.

**Relevance** — young people, as road users, see the value of what they are learning and its relevance to their lives.

**Breadth** — young people have the opportunity to learn and develop as road users through a range of experiences.

Personalisation and Choice — young people are given increasing opportunity for exercising responsible personal choice as road users.

Challenge and Enjoyment — road safety learning provides young people with experiences that are challenging at an appropriate level.

**Coherence** — road safety learning provides young people with opportunities for activities which draw different strands of learning together.

## Go Safe With Ziggy

To inspire a child's interest in road safety learning, exploring key themes through active experience and play. Children have the opportunity to work with the Road Safety Scotland resources at home and at school. The initiative has 3 key age groups 0-3, pre-school and transition into P1.

### Streetsense2

To challenge knowledge, attitudes and behaviours, enabling children to self-reflect.

### JRSO All Together for Road Safety

To encourage peer learning and promote road safety issues through partnership working.



The introduction of Junior Road Safety officers in P6 and P7 has allowed for the opportunity to raise awareness in school through competitions, assemblies and a noticeboard.

## Theatre-in-Education

To raise awareness of the coming dangers to which this age group will be exposed during the next few years, helping them realise why those dangers are particularly relevant to their age group and to enable them to analyse, discuss and change decisions and outcomes.

## Stop/Hometime

These resources increase the road safety awareness of young people using school transport highlighting pupils' responsibilities when crossing country roads after getting off the bus and to focus on distractions that can have potential tragic consequences.

## **Bikeability**

Bikeability is a multi-level programme designed to give pupils the skills and confidence on their bikes and have a good understanding of how to ride safety on quiet roads. Schools to deliver:


Playground training for Bikeability Level 1 to Primary 5 pupils On-road training for Bikeability Level 2 to Primary 6 & 7 pupils.

Appendix 5 – Safe Routes to School Map and Index




